Community Legal Education Ontario (CLEO)

Project Description

The purpose of the Youth Justice Resource Development Project was to research and compile an inventory of public legal education materials related to youth justice in Ontario. This inventory includes a listing of materials (that is by no means exhaustive) produced by youth-serving community organizations, government and government-related offices, and other agencies from across Ontario that deal with youth justice issues. The Department of Justice has provided funding to CLEO for this project.

How to Use the Inventory

- Listings that have an asterisk * beside the name indicate resources that are already included in the CLEONet Resources and Tools collection at <www.cleonet.ca>.
- Listings have been sorted by date in descending order, beginning with resources produced most recently. Listings with unknown publication dates have a blank “Year” column.
- Every resource listing includes information on availability in French. If the listing indicates ‘YES’, it will be accompanied by a link to the French version, or other information on where to find the French language resource.
- If a resource has been created for a specific audience (i.e., parents, youth, teachers, etc.) this information is located in the “Description” column.

Note to users

The main focus of the inventory was researching and compiling a list of public legal education materials that deal with the youth criminal justice system, including (but not limited to) information related to:

- the Youth Criminal Justice Act
- restorative justice
- dealing with police
- working with a lawyer
- appearing in court
- the court process
- alternatives to the court system
- impact of a court record

Many community organizations take a holistic approach to youth justice and consider resources that are typically categorized as family law, education law, health law, employment law, etc. as youth justice related. Some of these resources have been listed in this inventory. However, it should be mentioned that, as the project moves into its second phase and becomes part of the foundation upon which the youth justice section of CLEONet <www.cleonet.ca> is built, more of these resources will be developed and included in the inventory.
